Comprehensive Facilities Planning, Inc. conducted an assessment of the academic and academic support space needs of the campus. In addition, we analyzed the utilization of the classrooms required to perform the teaching functions, suggested alternative concepts for increased utilization and made recommendations for the re-use and or reassignment, if needed.

The outcome of this study was a comprehensive assessment that identified the academic space needs for the University and propose solutions for achieving the required physical plant. The results will form the foundation for a new campus master plan.

The approach that CFP employed to access the space needs and to translate the information into usable tools for the study included the following steps:

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- Collection of all available data including: the facilities space inventory and floor plans; student, faculty, and staff current and projected headcount and FTE data; department program and space needs; department course files; and credit hours of instruction.
- Meeting with the academic and administrative units to review the space planning assumptions, collect their thoughts on space trends on campus and the respective needs of the various programs, current strengths and weakness of the department in regard to space allocation and facilities, and the future space needs of each department and office included in the analysis.
- Evaluating the classroom use and utilization and recommending needs by size range and location.
- Summarizing the conclusions from the above data to provide the core team with the information necessary to determine the appropriate space allocation by room type.
- Review and verification of the student, faculty, and staff projections with key administration to ensure that they are in line with the campus plans for the future.
